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My Faith Experience at the Kolkata Merger Celebration

Standing at the altar on the day of the Kolkata Merger Celebration –22nd November, a date forever etched in the heart of our Province—I found myself at a threshold moment where history, grace, and mission converged with astonishing power. As I received the vows of our 45 sisters and placed the new CJ emblem—the cross of our unified identity—around their necks, something profoundly transformative stirred within the deepest chambers of my spirit.


This was far more than a ceremony. It was a spiritual homecoming—a sacred watershed moment in our collective journey as women religious. In that holy instant, I sensed with overwhelming clarity the mystery of God’s faithfulness: how the Divine Weaver gathers our personal journeys, our diverse histories, and even our differences into one radiant tapestry of mission. The merger of IBVM and CJ is not merely an administrative integration; it is a spiritual rebirth—a quiet Pentecost for our time. As I looked into the eyes of each sister renewing her “yes” to God, I felt the Spirit whisper with unmistakable tenderness: “This is holy ground.”

The weight of the CJ cross in my hands carried significance far beyond its physical form. It held our shared charism, the enduring Mary Ward heritage entrusted to us across centuries, and the sacred responsibility given to us by the universal Church. Placing the emblem on each sister became an act of blessing—an anointing—sealing this new chapter in which we walk forward as one Mary Ward family, united in purpose and bound in love.

The quiet strength of each sister’s self-offering—spoken and unspoken—moved me deeply. Their commitment, steady and unwavering like mountains, awakened within me a renewed sense of responsibility, a tender maternal care, and a hope brighter than any darkness we may encounter. In those moments, I felt God drawing me personally into a deeper covenant:

“Lead with courage that comes from Me.
Lead with tenderness that reflects My heart.
Lead with faith that sees beyond the visible.”

There was a moment—I cannot say exactly when—when tears filled my eyes. Not tears of sentiment, but of holy awe: awe at the mysterious ways God moves through our fragile, finite lives; awe at the unity before me—not uniformity, but harmony woven from our beautiful diversity; an awe in realizing that I was not merely presiding over a celebration, but participating in God’s eternal dream for us—a dream conceived before time and now unfolding in ours.



This experience has deepened my conviction that our mission is alive, dynamic and continually shaped by the Spirit's gentle yet urgent promptings. It has strengthened my faith that we are being led into a future where our companionship, our service to the marginalized, and our prophetic witness will shine with even greater clarity in a world hungering for authentic love.

A moment that touched me with particular tenderness was when I received my own emblem from one of our senior-most sisters. In that simple yet sacred gesture, I felt the weight and wonder of our lineage. I became deeply aware that who we are today is because of them—women who prayed, laboured, sacrificed, and carried the charism with unwavering fidelity through the decades.

Their hands, weathered by years of loving service, placed the emblem in mine, and I felt as though they were handing over not just a symbol, but a legacy—one shaped by courage, endurance, and boundless faith.

In that moment, I understood with clarity and conviction:

Now it is our time.

Our time, as 21st-century CJ sisters, to write a new chapter of the Mary Ward story.
Our time to create a legacy that will speak to future generations.

Our time to carry forward the fire they kept burning and let it shine with renewed relevance, daring, and compassion in a rapidly changing world.

Receiving the emblem was, for me, both a blessing and a commissioning—a reminder that we stand on the shoulders of giants, and that the future is now entrusted into our hands. As I stepped down from the altar at the conclusion of the celebration, what lingered in my heart was not weariness but a quiet, unshakeable certainty:

God is with us in this moment.

God walks ahead of us, preparing the way.

And God is working through us, transforming our “yes” into miracles beyond our imagining.

This is truly our kairos moment—and I am profoundly grateful to walk this sacred path with these remarkable women of faith.

The name Congregation of Jesus humbles and inspires me. It calls us to live ever more like Jesus—compassionate, courageous, just, and loving.

As we embrace this new identity, we carry forward the enduring light of Mary Ward and the richness of our Ignatian heritage. May this new chapter lead us to greater fidelity to God's dream for us.

Community Updates

The Dharan community is presently served by two Sisters—Sr. Priyanka and Sr. Anita. We are blessed with 10 Hostel girls, 11 Montessori children, and a supportive team of Staff. Our mission activities continue to grow through three tuition centers, a tailoring class, a computer class, and 13 active Self-Help Groups across various villages.

Spiritual Activities

The Parish conducted a three-day retreat for mothers, fathers, and youth at different times during the Puja holidays. Our parishioners also participated in a pilgrimage to Maheshpur, joining in a meaningful Holy Mass and fellowship meal, returning spiritually enriched.

In honor of the month of Mother Mary, we held an evening Holy Mass followed by a candlelight Eucharistic and Marian procession outside the campus. On 2nd November, we joined the parish community for the visit and blessing of the cemetery located in two different places.

Awareness Programmes

Over the past months, various awareness sessions were conducted for Self-Help Groups in their villages, as well as in our Tuition Centre, the Government School, and at our own Centre.
